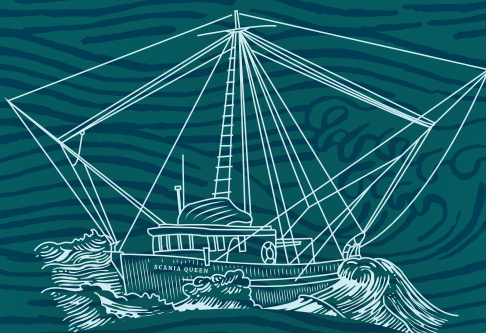

Stir The Pot

The view of the Heritage Foundation is that Oak Bay stirs the pot and provides a living example of the social success of corner stores and restaurants.



For thousands of years, the diet of Lekwungen-speaking people, living in the village of Sitchanalth, which is now known as Willows Beach, was balanced through the wide variety of local, seasonal, food sources. We think of salmon and camas immediately, but also whale and seal, and berries and other plants. In addition, the intertidal seafood included clams, other crustaceans, and eggs; and deer and elk were hunted.

In the settler community, Oak Bay's neighbourhood family restaurants and grocery stores have provided social cohesion, where neighbours, in the words of Noel Coward, "meet

coming out of shops". The restaurants and stores, with their familiar faces, provide a sense of belonging, and become heritage-valued nuclei, creating micro neighbourhoods. The restaurants are more than food providers; they become community meeting places.

The Oak Bay Grocery and Post Office opened in 1912, in the building that is now home to the **Oaks Restaurant**.



Willows Park Grocery opened circa 1912, located at the corner of Eastdowne Road and Dalhousie Street, continues serving the neighbourhood.

The Shoal Bay Tea Room served teas and ices to McNeill Bay campers, 1913 to the 1930s. The building permit describes a two-storey tea kiosk; over the next decade a dwelling was constructed attached to the kiosk. The marvellous part of this local history is that the tower-like kiosk is extant, hiding in plain sight on Beach Drive.



Casey's Market, at the corner of St. Patrick Street and Central Avenue, operated for approximately 80 years, closed recently. It was demolished, but Liv Café and Bistro continues the tradition.

The Windsor Café is located in the 1932 mixed commercial and residential complex, overlooking Windsor Park, at the former street-car terminus.



The Kiwanis Club of Oak Bay established a small beach-food hut on Willows Beach in 1947. It was replaced by the current **Tea Room** building, which opened in May 1949.



The Ottavio Italian Bakery & Delicatessen, Oak Bay Avenue, is located in a former duplex, built in 1934.



The Golden Galleon Coffee Shop, 2239 Oak Bay Avenue, in the 1950s, offered a coffee bar, fish and chips, and a jukebox.

de'lish, on St Patrick Street, originally a house, nestles gently in the neighbourhood.



The Demitasse Cafe & Garden Centre 1935 building permit listed a store and dwelling.



The Penny Farthing Pub and Restaurant occupies the former **Oak Bay Pharmacy**, built 1936.

Oak Bay's heritage-valued restaurants and grocery stores provide a taste of local history and continue to gently *stir the pot* and support community cohesion through neighbours meeting neighbours *coming out of shops*. 🌿

THE OAK BAY FIGURE SKATING CLUB

For nearly five decades, the Oak Bay Figure Skating Club has been quietly weaving itself into the fabric of the community, carving graceful arcs on the ice at the Oak Bay Rec Centre and shaping generations of skaters along the way.

Founded 47 years ago, the non-profit Oak Bay Figure Skating Club (OBFSC) reflects the character of the community it calls home. It is welcoming, close-knit, and deeply supportive. Head coach Kirsten Conforti, now in her 13th season with the club, describes it as a space that offers high-quality programs for all ages and levels. In practice, that means everyone, from young first-time skaters to adults rediscovering the joy of the sport, and to competition athletes chasing podium finishes. Boys and girls skate side by side at every level, sharing ice time, and encouragement from passionate coaches. Alongside Kirsten on the coaching team are Leonardo Maekawa, the club's Development Coordinator, CanSkate Coordinator Chanelle Whitmell, and club coach Mikayla Kramer.

The club's relationship with the wider community is something Kirsten is eager to keep growing. Last June,

OBFSC made a happy return to the Oak Bay Tea Party parade, participating for the first time in around a decade. For many residents, it served as a reminder that behind the rink doors is a vibrant, energetic group of local athletes and volunteers. Kirsten hopes to see more of those connections flourish, inviting the community to cheer from the stands, volunteer at events, or simply stop by to see local talent in action.



At the heart of the club's development pathway is Skate Canada's CanSkate program, often the first step in a lifelong relationship with skating. Designed with a fun, circuit-based format, CanSkate builds confidence and foundational skills in a supportive environment. Volunteerism is the backbone of the CanSkate program throughout the country and at Oak Bay, this is no different. Older skaters – many of whom learned their first stops and turns in the same rink – return to help guide and mentor beginners. As a result, new skaters feel supported not just by coaches, but by their peers.

Training looks different depending on where skaters are on their journey. Beginners

eventually made the city her home. Her connection to the Oak Bay Rec Centre began through learn-to-skate programs in her early twenties, and from there, her role within the skating community continued to grow.

In the photos here, 13-year-old Lucy Howland is pictured wearing a pink and red dress made by her aunt. As the Vancouver Island Region Juvenile U14 Champion, Lucy will represent the region at the BC Winter Games this month. Lucy trains six days a week, spending 2-3 hours each day in both on-ice and off-ice training. She also participates in a group plyometrics class to build speed, strength, and jumping ability for the ice. While the training is rigorous, Lucy tells us, "What I love about Oak Bay is that it feels like a close family. I love coming to skating everyday to see my friends."

may skate twice a week, while competitive athletes can be on the ice six to ten times weekly. With ice available six days a week and programs spanning all ages, the club truly embraces Skate Canada's "skating for life" model. In recent years, this has meant expanded adult programming and a growing synchronized skating program, allowing skaters to find joy and challenge in whatever form suits them best.

Kirsten's own path in skating mirrors this lifelong approach. Originally from Northern British Columbia, she spent her teenage summers training in Victoria and



Family plays a meaningful role in the Club. Kirsten's three children grew up at the rink, with the younger two volunteering with CanSkate and later pursuing coaching courses through Skate Canada. Luca, 17, is a CanSkate coach who helps at the Oak Bay rink whenever he can, while his older brother, Nico Conforti, 19, has the 2026 Provincial Junior Men's Champion title and is based on the Mainland coaching and pursuing his goals as a competitive figure skater in singles and pair competitions.

Kirsten is immensely proud of her sons and the skaters in the Club, saying "I want to pass on my love for this sport. It has taught me valuable life lessons and shaped me to be the person I am today. I hope all my students come away with great memories of their skating journey."

The coaching team at Oak Bay FSC are equally committed to development and care, fostering an environment where skill-building and character-building go hand in hand. Sportsmanship, camaraderie, and mutual respect are valued as highly as jumps and spins.

Those values were on full display at the Vancouver Island Interclub competition in November 2025, where Oak Bay FSC skaters brought home an impressive 19 medals and reclaimed the overall team trophy for the first time since 2018. During that competition, Kirsten learned that the medals were not the only rewarding takeaway. Strangers approached her throughout the weekend to compliment the club's sportsmanship, appreciating how Oak Bay skaters cheered for competitors from other clubs and lifted one another up. It was a moment that perfectly captured the club's spirit, bringing great pride to Kirsten and her team.

Success has continued, with the Adult Synchronized Skating team earning gold at the 2025 Skate Canada BC/YT Adult and Synchro competition. This is their biggest win to date. These achievements speak to a club moving confidently forward, expanding opportunities while staying grounded in its values.

After so many seasons, Kirsten finds it impossible to choose a single favourite memory. Instead, she treasures the relationships she has created over the years. She is touched when past students return to visit, sharing memories and stories of their time on the ice.

Looking ahead, Kirsten's goals are simple: to continue growing the club, to bring the joy of skating to more people, and to see skaters of all ages thrive.

Annual traditions like the December ice show, a spring club competition, and hopes for a skate-a-thon keep the calendar full and the community engaged.

Move Over Groundhogs

MEET VIOLET!

You've probably heard of Punxsutawney Phil or Wiarton Willie, the famous groundhogs who pop out every February 2 to forecast the weather.

But here on Vancouver Island, we don't have groundhogs. So, who do we turn to? Meet Vancouver Island Violet, or just Violet to her friends.



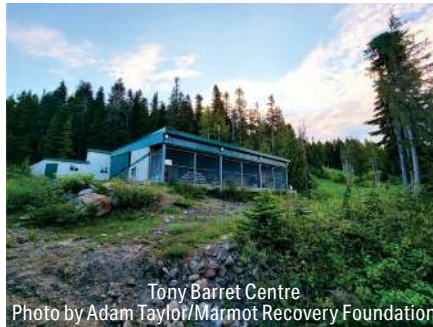

Violet isn't a groundhog at all, she's a Vancouver Island marmot (*Marmota vancouverensis*), and our island's very own weather forecaster. There are 14 marmot species worldwide, and while all groundhogs are technically marmots, not all marmots are groundhogs.

Vancouver Island marmots are critically endangered. In 2003, fewer than 30 remained in the wild, a devastating low. Thanks to the Marmot Recovery Program's tireless work over the past two decades, that number has climbed to over 420 in 2025. It's remarkable progress, but there's still a long journey ahead to reach a sustainable population.

At the Tony Barrett Mount Washington Marmot Recovery Centre, 89 marmots currently call it home, with 40 scheduled for release next year. Violet is among the 48 in the breeding program, and she takes her job seriously. Last year, she and her mate Philip welcomed their first litter, potential future explorers ready to be released into the alpine wilds.

Unlike their groundhog relatives, who are mostly solitary and live at lower elevations where gardens and shrubs are easy pickings, marmots are highly social animals. They live in colonies in sub alpine meadows above 800 metres, keeping watch for predators in a rugged, often unforgiving environment. When summer finally

weight for the next long winter. When you're on that tight of schedule, you can't afford to be picky about your salad greens.

Every month, even during hibernation, the marmots are carefully weighed to monitor their health and survival. That's where Violet's "forecasting" role comes in. On February 2, while being weighed, she and her team use a unique Marmot Weather Prediction Tool where she's gained quite the reputation in the past few years for accurately predicting long winters here on the Island.

With her chocolate-coloured coat, white belly, and bright white nose, Violet represents both the charm and vulnerability of this at-risk species. While progress has been made, the journey toward a fully recovered population continues.

You can help Violet, her family, and her community. The Marmot Recovery Program offers opportunities to provide a financial gift, adopt a marmot, or contribute sightings. With over 30 mountains of potential habitat, hikers play a crucial role in monitoring these animals.

This Groundhog Day, let's celebrate Violet, proof that even the sleepest marmot can make a big difference.

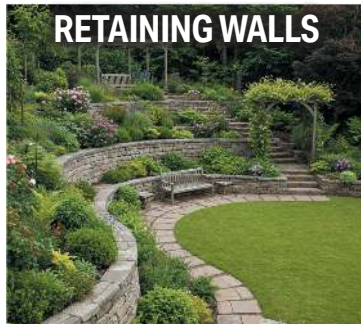
